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
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Why choose Cambridge English Qualifications?




Pre A1 Starters, A1 Movers and A2 Flyers are three exams produced by Cambridge University Press and Assessment. They are part of a range of Cambridge English Qualifications. Each exam builds on the skills children develop at the previous level.

Our exams are fun, colourful and activity-based, helping to motivate children to learn. Cambridge English Qualifications are based on real-life situations and help your child improve all four language skills – reading, writing, listening and speaking.







Our exams are designed to give confidence and reward what your child can do in English – nobody fails the exam. All children who take a Pre A1 Starters, A1 Movers and A2 Flyers exam will receive a certificate.

Children will be motivated to work towards certificates and earn 'shields' to record their progress.



Your child's school or local Cambridge English exam centre can give you all the information you need about registering your child for one of our exams, including entry costs and dates.

About the exams

There are three parts to the exam: Reading and Writing, Listening, and Speaking.

Here are some examples of the activities your child will do in the exams:

Reading

Children do tasks to show they can read and understand simple texts in English. In this example from Pre A1 Starters they show that they understand sentences describing a picture, by writing 'yes' or 'no'.

As children progress to A1 Movers and A2 Flyers, they learn to read and understand longer texts.



Writing

In the Writing paper, colourful pictures make the activity fun and easy to understand. In this example, from A1 Movers, children write words and sentences to describe the picture.



Listening


Listening activities are designed to show how well your child can understand simple English words and grammar. In this task from A2 Flyers, children tick the correct picture to show they have understood a conversation.

There are similar tasks in Pre A1 Starters and A1 Movers but children need to develop a wider vocabulary as they progress through the levels.



Speaking


Speaking tasks are fun and use colourful pictures – they don't feel like an exam. In this activity, from A1 Movers, children describe the difference between two pictures. Speaking examiners are specially trained to support and encourage your child to show what they can say in English.



Progression across the levels

As your child learns more English they can progress to the next level of exam. This will show that they are better able to understand and communicate in English than before.

These examples show how each exam adds a little more challenge and helps children to demonstrate their developing skills.



Exam day

On the day of the exam, your child will probably be excited. Remember that the exam is designed to reward what your child can do in English and to be enjoyable – nobody fails the exam. You can support your child by making sure they understand the information below.



How long is the exam?

The Pre A1 Starters exam is 45 minutes, the A1 Movers exam is 1 hour and the A2 Flyers exam is 1 hour 15 minutes in total.





What if I don't understand the examiner or the recording?

The examiner will repeat and show you what to do in the Speaking exam. In the Listening exam, you'll hear each recording twice.





Am I allowed to ask questions if I don't understand?

In Reading and Writing, raise your hand and someone will help you. In the Speaking test, you can ask the examiner.

You must not ask questions during the Listening test.





What if I don't know the answer to a question in the Reading and Writing exam? Don't panic! It's better to write an answer and try, than to write nothing.





I know I have to colour in the Listening exam, but I'm not very good at this. Will I lose marks? Don't worry! You just have to find the right part of the picture and use the right colour!





What can I do to support my child on exam day?

Keep calm on the exam morning. And prepare a healthy breakfast as usual!

Tell your child how excited and proud you are of them.

Remind them that the exam is colourful and fun and will help them to show you how much they know in English.

Tell your child that the exam will have the same types of questions as the practice exams that they do in class, so there will be no surprises.





After the exam

The hard work is done! The first thing you will receive is a Statement of Results for your child, which you can access online.

Your child's Statement of Results is personalised, and includes:

- · information on their strengths and what they can do in English
- · areas for improvement
- · ideas on how to improve.





Your child will have a separate score for each part of the exam: Speaking, Listening, and Reading and Writing.

This helps you see their achievement in different skills and identify areas for further improvement as they continue to learn English. On the Statement of Results there are also practical suggestions to help your child to progress further.

Certificate

Your child will receive a Cambridge English certificate to show what they can do in English. The certificate will be sent by post.

Remember, there is no pass or fail in Pre A1 Starters, A1 Movers and A2 Flyers. All children receive a certificate which shows how many shields they received in each skill (speaking, listening, reading and writing). The maximum score is five shields for each skill.







Contact your child's school or the exam centre to find out when your child's certificate will arrive.

If a child has achieved four or five shields in each skill, they are ready to start preparing for the next Cambridge English exam.

Next steps

Cambridge English Qualifications are for every stage in learning English. Pre A1 Starters, A1 Movers and A2 Flyers exams are just the first steps. A2 Key for Schools is at Level A2, like A2 Flyers, but it is for slightly older learners. It helps to consolidate what learners do in A2 Flyers and prepares them for higher level exams. The next exams are B1 Preliminary for Schools and B2 First for Schools, then learners can go on to take C1 Advanced and C2 Proficiency.
